Grandma Bishop Passed Away.

The funeral services of Mrs. Catherine Bishop was held at the Presbyterian church on Wednesday, October 14, 1914 at 2 o'clock in the afternoon by Rev. V. C. White assistant Rev. J. S. Howard, who was at one time her pastor. In his sermon he spoke of the faithfulness of the good woman in the earlier part of her life. How she attended the services when hardly able to get there and the inspiration of her presence at the divine service. He also spoke of her consecration and tried to bring her example to the living. The interment was made at Union Cemetery south of town.

Catherine Clark was born in Westmoreland county, Pennsylvania Aug. 11, 1892. Died at her home in Clarence Mo. Oct. 14, 1914. Age 92 years 2 months and 3 days. In 1841 she was married to Robert Bishop who departed this life in May 1884. To this union were born 7 children, 3 of whom are living, A. M. Bishop and Mrs. Wesley Free of this city and Mrs. J. W. Timbrook of Beebe, Arkansas. Besides these there are 15 grand children, 9 great grandchildren, and a host of relatives and friends to mourn their loss.

She became a Christian at Bethel Christian church soon after she was married while Rev. Wright was minister. She later moved her membership to the Clarence Christian church when she moved with her husband to her home just north of Clarence. Funeral services were held Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock at Bethel Christian church, conducted by Rev. Rolla G. Sears. Burial in the church cemetery.

BROKEN HIP FATAL TO AGED WOMAN
